

INTENSIVE COURSE IN ATHENS

What makes an urban landscape democratic? And for Whom?

May 2024

INTRODUCTION

Since the recognition of the Hellenic State in 1830, Athens has evolved into a contemporary Metropolis. The Intensive Course case study comprises of the campus of the Agricultural University of Athens (AUA) and surrounding area within a 1.5 km radius from AUA, including Elaionas, Votanikos and Akadimia Platonos. The study area since antiquity has undergone diverse landscape transformations and constitutes a complex landscape that is environmentally degraded and overlooked today by many. Yet the study area holds great historical, cultural and economic significance to the region and Hellenic State as well as great potential to restore the degraded environment and regenerate the landscape. Different stakeholders are active in the area and will reflect their own perspective about their landscapes, during the course.

Based on the above the objective of the course is to research, the elements, functions, and values of the studied landscape and introduce interventions based on various methods for landscape democratic transformation. Therefore, the research question addressed is:

What makes an urban landscape democratic? And for whom?

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The participants will be assigned into one of the four main theme groups ("Cultural and Industrial Heritage", "Biodiversity and Environment", "Daily life and Narratives" and "Social Economy") comprised by approximately 8-9 members. Each group will be supported by three tutors and one local coordinating tutor to facilitate the group tutors. The members of the groups will be divided and joined with members of the remaining divided groups to participate in scheduled visits on particular days visiting different locations of the study area. These mixed groups will "collect data" related to their main theme group.

The divided members will rejoin with their original group to brief each other on their collected data and work together on defining the aim, visioning the implementation (objectives) and determining strategies and/or design interventions for their proposed landscape democratic transformation.

On the 31st May each group will present their work. Each group will have 20 minutes to present their work and 10 minutes to address comments from the audience. It is expected that all members participate in the presentation of their group. Please rehearse the duration of your presentations to avoid potential delays or unpleasant interruption of your presentation on the actual day of your presentation.

The deliverables are different for each theme group, and are as follows:

"Cultural and Industrial Heritage" Strategies and Design proposals to enhance landmarks and routes of cultural and industrial heritage interest.

"Biodiversity and Environment" Strategies and Design proposals to regenerate green spaces, support biodiversity and mitigate the microclimate.

"Daily life and Narratives" Strategies and Design proposals to enhance leisure/recreational activities, facilitate mobility and develop social cohesion.

"Social Economy" Strategies and Design proposals to create a social economy center and introduce sustainable uses by developing a social business model.

Design proposals can be in any format, plan views, elevations/sections, sketches, 3D representations, drawings, models, etc. Narratives can be written (e.g. comic, storytelling, etc.), illustrated (e.g. drawings, sketches, images, videos, etc.) or recorded (audio or audio-visual anonymously through editing).

Competences


-Ability to evaluate the various findings from the methods for democratic landscape transformation.
